The Board of Public Works and Safety of Plymouth, Indiana, met in Regular Session at 6:00 p.m. on December 8, 2025. The meeting was held in the Council Chambers, on the second floor of the City Building, 124 N. Michigan St., Plymouth, Indiana.

Mayor Robert Listenberger called the meeting to order. Listenberger presided for Board members Duane Culp, Don Ecker Jr., Shiloh Milner, and Dave Miller, who were physically present. City Attorney Houin and Clerk-Treasurer Lynn Gorski were also present. The public was able to see and hear the meeting through Zoom and streamed live at https://www.youtube.com/@CityofPlymouth.

Board members Morrow and Milner moved and seconded to approve the minutes of the regular session of the Board of Public Works and Safety meeting of November 24, 2025, as presented. The motion carried.

City Engineer Dan Sellers informed the board he received notice that we did not receive the Community Crossings Matching Grant (CCMG) for the maintenance projects that we had scheduled. He stated we were going to have a meeting tomorrow and decide our best path forward, but we would have to cut back on some streets.

Mayor Listenberger stated he appreciated them for trying but it was disappointing. He explained he was at a conference last week with other mayors and they asked who did not receive CCMG and almost nobody had received it.

Building Commissioner Dennis Manuwal Jr. asked the board for permission to solicit bids from contractors to do the remediation at The Pointe Apartments on the asbestos. He stated he received one quote, and the price was higher than expected.

Board members Morrow and Culp moved and seconded to approve the request as presented. The motion carried.

Culp stated last week he asked about the old McCord's building on Water Street, and he had received two phone calls about it. He asked if they had investigated it.

Manuwal replied there were some bricks that had fallen off on the north side and there was a portion of the wall on the east side just north of the garage door where it had started leaning more than what it was the last time he was there. He stated that Plan Director Ty Adley reached out to his contact with Brownfields, and they are supposed to be working faster at getting us the information.

Mayor Listenberger stated if they could not get definite time frames, then he would suggest that we have the owner barricade that north and east sidewalk. Manuwal agreed.

Culp asked if it was something that could go into the roadway if it fell.

Manuwal replied with how close the building was to the roadway it would.

Ecker stated that it would become a burden on the owner of the building to secure that.

Houin stated that it gets complicated because we know that there was potential environmental contamination and because of that there were restrictions on what they can and can't do. He stated they can't just go in and tear down the building and did not believe there was anything they could do as far as remediation without demolishing the building. He stated that Adley was working with Michiana Area Council of Governments (MACOG) and the Brownfields representatives, and we had been expecting a go-ahead from the State for a couple of months now and it was taking a lot longer.

Culp stated that whoever owned the building needed to be safe and responsible, so it doesn't fall and hurt anybody. He felt that barricading was a great idea.

Street Superintendent Jim Marquardt made a last call for fuel bids and read the following bids aloud:

He asked to take the bids under advisement.

Board members Milner and Ecker moved and seconded to take the bids under advisement. The motion carried.

Board members Ecker and Milner moved and seconded to take the request for directional signs off the table from Jay Buchtel for Marshall County DAV Chapter 42. The motion carried.

Marquardt stated North American Signs got back with a quote of \$654 per sign for a total of \$2,616. He stated he spoke to Buchtel and he said they did not have the money for something

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like that and they were not sure if they would be coming to the meeting or not. He said he would

run the request by the board, but he did not know where the money would come from. He stated

that it would change four way-finding signs completely as they could not be added to. He stated

that the DAV Chapter 42 was based out of the Life Enrichment Center, and it says "Life

Enrichment Center" on the current signs.

Ecker stated this had been going on for two months and he did not see the benefit of

moving forward with this request.

Culp stated he would be opposite of what Ecker said. He believed that organization was

superb and we have spent other money on other things so for \$2,000, maybe they could get a

design that was specific for adding to them instead. He stated he was aware it was \$2,000 but he

would not support the negative.

Mayor Listenberger stated it would help if we could invite them here to discuss their

request.

Margaurdt stated they were very aware of the price, and they said they don't have the

money to do that.

Culp stated that most disabled veterans do not but they're a great organization.

Morrow stated he agreed with Culp and what he was saying, but it seemed to him that

they could market themselves, "located at the Life Enrichment Center." He stated that he did not

think the taxpayers necessarily should be paying it.

Milner stated we should ask them to come and comment on these questions.

Gorski stated they were originally invited to come when they dropped off this request on

October 1st.

Board members Ecker and Morrow moved and seconded to deny the directional sign

requests as presented. The motion passed by roll call.
