

REGULAR SESSION, COMMON COUNCIL, May 11, 2026

Be it Remembered that the Common Council of the City of Plymouth, Indiana, met in regular session on May 11, 2026. The meeting was held in the Council Chambers, on the second floor of the City Building, 124 N. Michigan St., Plymouth, Indiana, and was called to order at 6:33 p.m.

Councilwoman Starr offered a prayer, and Mayor Listenberger led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Robert Listenberger presided over Council members Don Ecker Jr., Kayla Krathwohl, Randy Longanecker, Shiloh Carothers Milner, Dave Morrow, and Linda Starr, who were physically present. Council member Duane Culp attended virtually. City Attorney Jeff Houin and Clerk-Treasurer Lynn Gorski were also present. The public was able to see and hear the meeting through Zoom and streamed live at <https://www.youtube.com/@CityofPlymouth>.

Council members Starr and Ecker moved and seconded to approve the minutes of the regular session of the Common Council on April 27, 2026, as presented. The motion passed by roll call vote with all in favor.

Council Members listed the following:

- Starr: The Pointe Apartments building was officially demolished. Provided appreciation to the Building Commissioner for getting it done.
- Starr: Had a great Mayor's Prayer Breakfast.
- Longanecker: Wondering when we would see the Police E-Bikes. Assistant Police Chief Matthew Emmehiser stated the School Resource Officer (SRO) Steve Delee loves riding, and we should see him riding around soon.
- Morrow: Asked about a strategy for checking the golf carts for proper tags. Addressed prior concerns about Golf Carts being on the Greenways Trail, not being properly tagged, etc. Emmehiser replied that we push that information out to our officers to keep an eye on that, but methods of catching unregistered golf carts include the E-Bikes, Park Patrol, and our SRO's coming back to patrol when not in school would provide additional resources.

City Attorney Houin presented CF-1's for tax abatements submitted as follows:

Houin commented that this was the last of the CF-1's for the year.

Council members Longanecker and Starr moved and seconded to approve all CF-1's as presented. The motion passed by roll call vote with all in favor.

City Attorney stated that the applicant has withdrawn PC 2026-06, Certified Proposal to Amend the Official Zoning Map for the City of Plymouth.

Clerk-Treasurer Gorski stated that the city had received 7 donations: 3 in the amount of \$1,000.00/each from K B Gourmet Group, USI Consultants, and Troyer Group to be used for the Mayor's Summer of Music. 1 in the amount of \$500.00 from Interra Credit Union to be used for the Tractor Show. 1 in the amount of \$300.00 from Wild Rose Moon to be used for the Tree Committee, 1 in the amount of \$50.00 from Bertha Blue for the Police Department, with no designation. 1 in the amount of \$1,250.00 from Essential Wellness Solutions to be used for Police Vehicle Sponsorship. She asked if they wished to accept the donations with the restricted terms, conditions, and purpose attached to the donation. She stated the donations would be receipted into the Monetary Gift Fund.

Council members Ecker and Milner moved and seconded to approve the donations as presented. The motion passed by roll call vote with all in favor.

Morrow asked if the Mayor's Summer of Music was self-sustaining with donations and if no city budget was used.

Gorski replied that he was correct for the most part.

Morrow asked what would happen if we collected more donations than needed, if they would roll into the following years.

Gorski replied in agreement that it would stay in the City Monetary Gift Fund. Although last year there was not enough collected, so the overage was paid out of the Promotion of the City Fund.

City Attorney Houin introduced Ordinance No. 2026-2259, An Ordinance to Amend the City of Plymouth Building Code to Require Emergency Key Boxes on first reading.

City Attorney Houin introduced Ordinance No. 2026-2260, An Ordinance Regarding Permit and Application Fees for the City of Plymouth on first reading.

Houin stated this was a joint effort with Plan Director Ty Adley and Building Commissioner Dennis Manuwal. He stated they've tried to determine exactly what it costs the city to process those various applications that are listed there and set the fees to correspond to the actual cost of processing those.

Longanecker stated the prices were in comparison to what he normally sees.

City Attorney Houin introduced Resolution No. 2026-1200, City of Plymouth Internal Controls Policy.

Gorski read aloud the changes, which included but were not limited to:

- Disbursements
- Payroll procedures
- Receipts
- Federal Grant Audit
- Penny Phaseout

Council members Ecker and Longanecker moved and seconded to approve Resolution No. 2026-1200, City of Plymouth Internal Controls Policy as presented. The motion passed by roll call vote with all in favor.
